



MWF Mineral Study Group (Gold & Silver)

Last month we looked at rocks that glow in the dark (under black light). This month we looked at the metals that glisten in the sunlight, gold and silver (and their ores).

A solid solution series exists between gold and silver. Native gold often contains around 10% silver. Gold with more than 20% silver is known as Electrum. The average concentration of gold in the earth's crust us .004 ppm, and for silver it is .07 ppm. Sea water contains 4 kg of gold per cubic km.

There are more than 30 minerals that contain gold, but most gold is found in its native form in ores that contain about 10 grams per ton. Only three gold ores, Calaverite, Petzite, and Sylvanite are of economic importance.

Silver occurs in about 150 different minerals, but only 10% of them are of economic importance; Acanthite, Aurorite, Chlorargyrite, Dyscrasite, Empressite, Freibergite, Hessite, Miargyrite, Naumannite, Pearceite, Polybasite, Prousite, Pyrargyrite, Stephanite, and Stromeyerite.

Silver used to be important as a monetary metal and most coins used to contain the metal. It was also important in photography before the digital revolution; many silver minerals experience color changes on exposure to light (they also tarnish on exposure to the atmosphere). Silver in low concentrations is effective in killing bacteria.

Most gold and silver is used in jewelry today. Silver is the best conductor of electricity of all metals, and finds many uses in industry and chemistry. Gold is effectively inert chemically.

Our Mineral Study Group likes to learn about the science and practical uses of the minerals we study, but we also want to learn to hand identify them. Hand identification is a skill you learn from holding and studying many different specimens of a given mineral. We do our homework on the science and come prepared to discuss the mineral of the month, but we also dig through our collections and come with one or more specimens for everyone to handle. We had a lot of interesting specimens to look at this month, and not all were gold nuggets. We ran a bit late looking at all the specimens.

The next meeting of the West Michigan MWF Mineral Study Group will be held on Tuesday, November 13, 2012, from 7pm to 8:30 pm, at the home of Kreigh Tomaszewski, 653 Burton St. S.E., Grand Rapids, MI 49507. We are going to study minerals that contain uranium. If you have not noticed, we are on a theme looking at minerals that "glow" in various ways. Everyone will be required to wash their hands before leaving next month's mineral study as a safety precaution since we will be handling 'hot' rocks. BTW, many radioactive minerals also glow under black light.

We try to start (and end) on time (we often finish a little early); please do not arrive more than 20 minutes early (everyone gets thrown out by 9). All West Michigan rockhounds are invited to attend. Please look up a few facts about radioactive minerals, and bring some example specimens from your collection; I hope you can join us as we learn about minerals from each other (even if you can't bring any specimens). And we usually have time to look at an unrelated unknown you might need help on (no promises of a positive ID).
