

Land Closures by Management Decisions

OK you voted (or should have). Now read this important article from the AMFS November newsletter and call your Senator & Congressperson. Better yet write them regarding PUBLIC access for rock collecting on PUBLIC land - Jason Hefner you Editor.

With the slow down in legislative action this election year the Public Land Use (Restriction) bills before congress are mostly on the back burners for the remainder of this congressional session. It does not look likely that much will be happening until after the November election. That does not leave very much time for any action on the bills that have been introduced and referred to the appropriate committees for review and recommendations. If no action has been taken the bills introduced during this session will die in committee and need to be reintroduced during the next congressional session. There is one "unless", and that "unless" is, if the Land Use Bills before congress are consolidated into one large piece of legislation and attached to some other bill, like what happened in 2008 with the "Omnibus Land Bill Act of 2008", which made it a federal felony to collect vertebrate fossils on Federal Public Lands, then there would be cause for concern.

This does not mean that all is well for Amateur Rock, Mineral and Fossil collecting on BLM and USFS managed Public Lands. These Federal Agencies, through Congressional Mandate several years ago, must provide to congress a Land Management Plan for all managed land under their jurisdiction. The creation of these plans has been in the development cycle for several years. They have been labeled Resource Management Plans (RMP) and Travel Management Plans (TMP) and through congressional mandate are required to have open public hearings and input from all stakeholders. Included in these management plans are the allowable activities and the designated roads and trails within the managed areas. All roads and trails within the management areas must be identified and publicized.

MWF Mineral Study Group (Uranium)

The last couple months we have been looking at minerals that "glow" in various ways. This month we looked at minerals that contain the element Uranium and are radioactive.

There are over 200 minerals that contain Uranium. Concentrations range from 3 to 88%. All such minerals need to be handled with care. The biggest risk is accidental ingestion of Uranium, or exposure to mucus membranes. We washed our hands during this study more than once.

Most of the Uranium minerals are oxidation or secondary minerals derived from Uraninite, the most common primary mineral. Uraninite is found in Pegmatite, Placer, and Hydrothermal environments. The other four principal commercial ores of Uranium are Meta-Autunite (Pegmatite), M-Tyuyamunite (Pegmatite), Carnotite (Roll Front), and Tobernite (Oxidation). The minor commercial ores of Uranium are Schoepite (Oxidation), Becquerelite (Oxidation), Fourmarierite (Oxidation), and Uranophane (Roll Front).

Uranium produces about 16% of all electrical power in the US.

Many Uranium minerals are fluorescent. Uranium minerals tend to have either very bright colors, or be very drab. We had fun with a black light, but we also used a geiger counter to see how the specimens 'glowed'. A few specimens were hot enough that the collectors keep them in the garage to avoid breathing radon. Most specimens are safe because alpha and beta emissions are stopped by glass, plastic, or a few inches

of air; gamma radiation is an issue, but not all radioactive specimens emit gamma radiation (it depends on the decay method).

Radioactive minerals have a half-life. Half of the isotope atoms will decay and emit radiation across some time period. The longer the time period, the safer the mineral is (because it emits less radiation per time unit). Most radioactive minerals go thru a series of radioactive decays before they reach a stable element (often lead), and some stages have very short half-lives. This half-live is the basis of Carbon-14 dating (and a variety of other alternatives) for fossils.

Our Mineral Study Group likes to learn about the science and practical uses of the minerals we study, but we also want to learn to hand identify them. Hand identification is a skill you learn from holding and studying many different specimens of a given mineral. We do our homework on the science and come prepared to discuss the mineral of the

month, but we also dig through our collections and come with one or more specimens for everyone to handle. We managed to collectively come up with almost 10% of all the Uranium containing minerals. We really did learn from each other.

The next meeting of the West Michigan MWF Mineral Study Group will be held on Tuesday, January 8, 2013, from 7pm to 8:30 pm, at the home of Kreigh Tomaszewski, 653 Burton St. S.E., Grand Rapids, MI 49507. We are going to study blue minerals. We have decided to start a study sequence based on the colors of the rainbow (blue was the first color mentioned - VIBGYOR).

Continued from previous page We try to start (and end) on time (we often finish a little early); minutes early (everyone gets thrown out by 9). All West Michigan rockhounds are invited to attend. Please look up a few facts about blue minerals, and bring some example specimens from your collection; I hope you can join us as we learn about minerals from each other (even if you can't bring any specimens). And we usually have some time to look at an unrelated unknown you might need help on (no promises of a positive ID).

Geology Christmas Ornaments Editor

There are a few example on the internet of geologists making Christmas ornaments. Here are a few suggestions.

- Slab ornaments attach 1 a string to a nice looking slab and you have an ornament.
- 2. Cab ornaments – attach a string to cab (whatever size you want to make) and you have an even prettier ornament.
- 3. Geode ornament – pick a nice looking and light geode to make a conversation piece ornament.
- 4. Tumbled – glue small tumbled pieces to a existing plastic ornament to create your own.

These roads and trails may lead to Rockhound collecting sites. If the road to the collecting site is not on the list of approved please do not arrive more than 20 open roads the only way to get to the collecting site is by foot. This access battle for open roads has been waged for several years now and some process is being made thanks to a few concerned Rockhounds. There are more dangers to Rockhounds in some of these RMPs and TMPs than roads. One example is in the Bakersfield Field Office Resource Management Plan Revision.

This plan is in its final stage of review and is close to approval and implementation. As an example, when this plan goes into effect, it will close the collecting area known as Horse Canyon, near Tehachapi, California. The Horse Canyon Agate is unique. This is the only green tubercular agate in North America. Under this RMP access to this collecting site will be closed and so will collecting of any kind within the area of the canyon under BLM control. This type of language is appearing in many of the Land Management Plans being released for public review and comment before presentation to congress for final approval.

Even though congressional action has slowed, Rockhounding sites are in greater jeopardy of loss through internal Public Land Management review and decisions. With a stroke of the management pen collecting sites and access may be closed in the name of resource protection. It is up to Rockhounds to make their voices heard so collecting sites and amateur collecting on public lands remain a viable hobby now and for future generations to enjoy.
