ARE YOU WILLING TO DO A CLEAN-UP AS PART OF YOUR FIELD TRIPS ON PUBLIC LANDS?

ALAA is asking you to get involved. When your club goes out on a field trip on public or state lands, contact the land managers and offer to do a clean-up of the site or a nearby site they choose. Ask for a representative to be with you on the day of the clean-up to supervise and to make arrangements to haul away the trash, etc.

TAKE PICTURES of the event.

Suggestion: contact ALAA for some ALAA TRASH BAGS with the ALAA logo. The government agency may already have plastic trash bags available, but when you take pictures put the ALAA trash bags in front! Send the pictures with your club name and location, and the location of the clean-up and the government body who supervised the event to ALAA at info@amlands.org. The photos will be posted on the ALAA website and also get a write-up in the ALAA Newsletter. Also, send a picture and article to the MWF editor for recognition there too. Let's get rockhounds recognized once again. This kind of cooperation will help us when we ask the government to keep our public lands open for all of us. NOTE: Receiving the ALAA trash bags will take time, so plan ahead.

Tucson Report by Everett Harrington

Every winter, the mineral and fossil world meets in Tucson Arizona as it becomes an energetic, international marketplace of buyers and sellers of rocks, minerals, fossils in all rock and lapidary related categories.

The "Gem Show" (as it is called locally) is much more than a single event at one location. Rather, there are well over 50,000 attendees at more than 35 sites around town. Dozens of shows take place at the same time. Some of the shows that I attended this year were, The Arizona Mineral & Fossil Show

February 2-16th at the Hotel Tucson City Center (formerly Inn Suites Hotel) this show is a mix of high end dealers along with Miners and Collectors who peddle their superb fine specimens to the world. This Hotel takes over 200 rooms and transforms each to a mini mineral rock shop. Removing the beds from the room, they then bring in display cases and line the walls.

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MWF Mineral Study Group (Yellow Minerals)

Color is not generally a reliable key for mineral identification, but it is useful enough that some field guides use it as their primary key. We decided to run with it this year and go thru the colors of the rainbow. In hopes of spring daffodils we studied yellow minerals this month.

Our Mineral Study Group likes to learn about the science and practical uses of the minerals we study, but we really want to learn to hand identify them. Hand identification is a skill you learn from holding and studying many different specimens of a given mineral (and doing some homework on its physical properties). We do our homework on the science and come prepared to discuss the mineral of the month, but we also dig through our collections and come with one or more specimens for everyone to handle. We really do learn from each other (and you have to share specimens with others before they can be appreciated).

The concept behind our color study theme is to have as many different minerals of a given color, to examine together, so we can learn to distinguish between them. Again this month we had a microscope hooked up to a laptop so we could look at the specimens up close, with better lighting than using a hand lens.

Our group came up with an interesting collection of yellow minerals, of various shades, and a few of them were quite outstanding specimens (especially under magnification). It was a little surprising that many contained uranium and were very similar (we washed our hands afterwards as a precaution). I know the names are not all going to be spelled correctly, but we got to hand examine specimens of sulfur, autunite, pharcalite, carnotite, shoderite, francevillite, curieite, monahanite, uranocircite, volbothanite, potsite, tyuyamunite, fluorapatite, alunogen, sideronatrite, copiapite, fibroferrite, sturmanite, liabigite, hayiesite, melanterite, ettringite, alophane, orpiment, wolfunite, and gold. Several of the specimens were type locality specimens (they came from where the mineral was first discovered).

It is one thing to look at the pictures in the field books, but you get a much deeper appreciation when you can hold the specimen and look at it thru a lens (feel the heft, shine a bright light on it, etc.). And then look at another specimen of the same mineral (and maybe another). And then look at something else that is close but different.

The group was a little small this month. Bad weather, coming off our club show, and a conflicting event at another club in the area were contributing factors. But some homework was done, and we learned a bit about the phosphates, sulfides, sulfates, tungstates, carbonates, oxides, phyllosilicates, and native elements we studied.

The next meeting of the West Michigan MWF Mineral Study Group will be held on Tuesday, May 14, 2013, from 7 pm to 8:30 pm, at the home of Kreigh Tomaszewski, 653 Burton St. S.E., Grand Rapids, MI 49507. We are going to 'fade to black' for our last study before the summer break. Everyone should have a few black minerals in their collection they can bring to talk about and pass around (bonus points for luster and crystal form), so there is no excuse for not participating in our last study of the club season.

We try to start (and end) on time; please do not arrive more than 20 minutes early (and everyone gets thrown out at 9). All West Michigan rockhounds are invited to attend. Please look up a few facts about your black minerals, and bring some of the specimens from the dark side of your collection. I hope you can join us as we learn about minerals from each other (look up some facts even if you can't bring any black specimens and we will give you a lump of coal, or some other black mineral, to take home).

We usually have some time at the end to look at an unrelated unknown you might need help on (no promises of a positive ID, but we are getting better at identifying minerals). Hope you can join us for the next meeting (and let part of your collection get to meet some other rockhounds).

From these cases they sell their wares. Some of my favorite rooms are the self-collected specimen miners. John Cornish of John Cornish Minerals who is in room 186 always has a smile and some beautiful specimens can be found in his room as well. John is a miner and field collector and has just returned from Tasmania where he was digging the new large Crocoite find. He also digs at locations like Petersen Mountain for quartz scepters, California for tourmalines and many other world class locations. Another exciting room to visit is Jared Freiburg of Saga Minerals found in room 240. Jared is responsible for bringing to grass the large calcites from underneath Chicago several years ago. This year's room was full of marvelous specimens from Elmwood Mine in Tennessee. Stunning cubes of fluorite ranging from inch sized cubes up to several pieces in the one foot to 18 inches range, it was well worth the visit. Several other rooms worth mentioning are: Fabre Minerals in room 164, Alfredo Petrov in room 340 and Bruce Wood minerals in room 177. This show is one of the best all-around shows in Tucson with a range of specimen prices and sizes to meet any budget or collectors size preference. The animated dinosaurs in the courtyard this year were a major attraction above and beyond the minerals found here.

Another of my favorite locations to visit is the Kino Gem & Mineral Show (Formerly Tucson Electric Park Gem & Mineral Show). Here rockhounds from all across the US travel to Tucson to show off their finds, selling and trading. With over 180 dealers and RV spots, this show takes some time to walk and look at everybody's treasures. There's something for everyone at this public show, from gold and diamonds to granite bookends and glass beads, and from fine specimens of dinosaur fossils to opals gleaned from the Australian Outback.

The I-10 corridor is riddled with one show after another for about 7 miles of this bustling area. The Grant Inn show is the South end of the corridor, following I10 frontage road North you come to the Ramada Inn show, Day Inn show, Clarion Inn show, Howard Johnson show, Pueblo show, and the Riverpark inn show. Each show has a full selection of great specimens from all over the world. You'll observe that at each different event, the dealers will be from a different geographical region of the world.

The main event of this two-week mineral and fossil showcase is The Tucson Gem and Mineral show which packs downtown's Tucson Convention Center over the ending weekend. This show attracts thousands of treasure hunters from every corner of the globe and is open to the public.

There are displays from distinguished museums and personal collections along with in excess of 250 mineral, gemstone, jewelry and fossil retail dealers. It also features open lectures and seminars, and a Junior Education Area.

If you have never had the awe-inspiring, jaw dropping experience of being in Tucson during the biggest Mineral show on earth, you have got to attend. If you wear holes in your socks, have your eyes bugging out of your head...and acquire Tucson toe...you know you've seen the unsurpassed minerals, the most extravagant fossils and experienced something that you'll never stop thinking about, the Tucson Gem and Mineral show!!
