

You will be reading this in March so I hope that the weather has finally warmed up. This winter has reminded me of living in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and being so ready for spring to come every year. Hopefully it has warmed up by now and we can get out and look for some rocks.

We are coming up on the 75th anniversary of the MWF. We will be celebrating this at the MWF convention in 2015. On the 50th anniversary, a book was put together to commemorate it. We are working on putting together a similar book for the 75th anniversary, and hope to update it at least every 10 years from now on.

This has me reading the history of the MWF from that 50th anniversary book, and it is really fascinating how the MWF has grown over the years and the many mile markers that we have passed.

From that book, I learned the MWF was formed: "On December 7, 1940, about twenty delegates from five organizations met in the Art Room at Field Museum and the MID-WEST FEDERATION OF GEOLOGICAL SOCIETIES became a reality.

Its purpose: "To achieve a more accurate and widespread knowledge and appreciation of geology, in all its phases, especially in the Mid-West, through the cooperative endeavor of individuals and organizations in this region."

It appears that my previous guess at why the MWF was formed was accurate, to have a place where individuals and organizations could cooperate and further the hobby that we have all chosen.

Do you know who makes up the MWF organization? You do! We have a lot of people who are donating their time, talent, and money to chair all of the committees we have formed over the years, including the efforts of the Officers and State Directors, to keep this organization going, but they cannot do everything. You are the MWF, all of the people reading this newsletter, all of the clubs that belong to the MWF; you are the reason we are here.

When was the last time you contacted someone in the MWF to offer help? If it was recently, thank you for pitching in. We need more communication from everyone who is a member of the MWF. That is how we can make the Midwest Federation of Mineralogical and Geological Societies the best that it can be. Communication is the key.

When I took over this position, I asked for the different clubs to send me their newsletters so I could find out what was going on with the member clubs. I was a little worried whether I would have time to read each one every month. I guess I did not have to worry, since, in addition to the newsletters I was already receiving through our newsletter exchange for our club, I received only three more newsletters. Thanks to those of you who have sent me your newsletters.

Communication today is a lot simpler than it has ever been. Just type out a message and hit send. Within a matter of minutes your message is in the other person's inbox and it didn't cost you a cent because you're already connected for all the other things that you do on the internet. How great is that?

Does your club communicate with other clubs that are in near proximity, and offer help with all the things that we all do as a club? I know this stuff is a lot harder than it seems, just talking about it here. We usually only communicate with someone because we need help or an answer to a question from someone else. How nice would it be if that were different?

How else do we communicate? The MWF has at least one meeting and a convention every year; does anyone from your club attend? Especially the convention, where the annual meeting is held, every club should attempt to send a delegate to this meeting. We have well over a hundred clubs and every year we are worried whether we will have a quorum of 10% of those clubs to be able to vote on the business at hand. Wouldn't it be great if we just had to worry about where we are going to put everyone because we have delegates from 30% or more of the clubs?

Let's make it a priority this year to communicate more with everyone who enjoys the hobby of earth sciences. I remember someone asking one time, "How do I learn about all of this stuff?" Attending your own club meetings is a start. Other ways to learn are to help with the work of putting on the meetings, help the leaders of your club with their duties, help with your club's show, and communicate with as many people as possible who have similar interests as you. This is why the MWF and, actually, each of our home clubs, were formed in the first place.

Congress to Begin Work on Recreation Fee Legislation Via Western Slope No-Fee Coalition

Recreation fees for parks and public lands are governed by the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act (FLREA). Very soon, legislation to replace, revise or repeal FLREA is going to move forward in Congress. Now is the time for the public to weigh in.

You can sit back, do nothing, and let the American Recreation Coalition (ARC), the US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and National Park Service set the agenda. Or you can take action and make sure the members of Congress who will decide the issues take the public's concerns into account.

Here is what the ARC has announced it wants to see:

- "Dynamic" pricing, to promote a shift in use to non-peak periods and less-used places. In other words, pay extra for the most popular places at the best times of year.
- Raising the price of senior lifetime passes from \$10 to \$80, and/or raising the eligibility age from 62 to 70.
- Eliminating the free lifetime pass for those with a permanent disability and begin charging \$80 for it.
- Lowering the age of free entry from 16 to 12.
- ARC also wants a "prestige pass" at a premium price, for those who want to be able to go to the
 front of the line, use reserved close-in parking, and generally not have to mix with their fellow
 citizens of lesser means.

For the ARC, it's all about generating revenue, not about finding ways to encourage more people to enjoy healthy, active, outdoor activities.

If you agree with these proposals, then by all means do nothing.
