

# New Wilderness Areas in Montana and the Reason Why A News Report from: Citizens for Balanced Use summarized by Tom Noe. ALAA

CBU has always been opposed to new wilderness and "land of no use," and we will continue to fight for multiple-use recreation, active forest management, and responsible resource development on our current federally managed public lands. Maybe it is time to start an orderly transfer of these public lands back to the states—for us to effectively manage them in a way that benefits our state and our communities.

The Defense Spending Bill was a must-pass piece of legislation and legislators attached their pork in order to pass some things they wanted. Senator McCain was the first. His bill opened a large copper mine in his state, producing 6,000 new jobs. Then the environmental groups got enraged about that and wanted something in return. So Senator Tester added his Forest Jobs and Recreation Act, setting aside another 650,000 acres of new wilderness in Montana.

CBU worked hard to have this added piece of legislation removed and in the end Congressman Daines succeeded. But in return for removing the FJRA, the Rocky Mountain Front Heritage Act was inserted. It adds approximately 67,000 acres to two wilderness areas and designates roughly 208,000 acres of adjacent federal land as Conservation Management Areas. The bill protects existing agricultural uses, prohibits management of a buffer zone to the Conservation Management Area, and protects valid and existing mineral rights, among other things.

Are we happy? No. But it could have been worse.

CBU is very disappointed in how Congress jammed these bills into a must-pass Defense Spending Bill. We are saddened for the people close to the Rocky Mountain Front because of the further restrictions and closures they received. We are angry that these political stunts are pulled and we are frustrated by all the thousands of miles driven and the hundreds of hours spent by our members and supporters in fighting this bad legislation. The Rocky Mountain Front wilderness bill was opposed by local government, recreation, agriculture and resource groups. In the end we lost. If we had more control over these lands, rather than the D.C. bureaucrats, these actions would not occur.

# Planes, Trains, Buses, and Cars... a Tucson to Remember

After an uneventful series of flights to Tucson Az. for the annual Rock and Mineral show I found myself in one of the craziest expeditions of my life on the way home. I had spent 6 days and nights traveling around to the different Tucson Mineral shows throughout the city. I had met wonderful new people, ate great meals with even greater people. My trip home gave me time to reflect.

I was due to fly out of Tucson Saturday morning, which also happened to be Valentine's Day. Unknown to me, there was a major storm brewing towards home that had not even begun to start yet. I had a 7 am flight from Tucson International Airport to Atlanta where I was supposed to change planes for the final leg home to South Bend IN., where my car was waiting in the cold and snow. With my very early flight out of Tucson I phoned Yellow cab to come get me at 4:30 am so I could get my bags, which were full of minerals, and myself through security at the airport with time to spare. Sitting waiting on my flight gave me a chance to think back to all the wonderful things I'd seen. The minerals that are presented for sale at the shows are some of the finest in the world. Foot tall Tourmalines from Brazil, 18 inch Stibnites from China, 6 inch pyrite cubes from Spain, plus many more other treasures were seen. The colors of the minerals, the sizes of some of the crystals are just mind blowing. It is a rock hound overload to see all the wonderful specimens all nicely lit up and available for anybody to purchase.

I boarded the plane headed for Atlanta, thinking about all of my house mates that I stayed with. My good friend Ray Hill sets up a house every year in Tucson where mineral collectors can stay and be able to visit with others of like kind. This year was no exception. Besides Ray and myself, we had two others staying in the house with us. Steve Stuart was one of those fellow mineral collectors, staying with us. Steve and I have had crossed paths in previous years, mostly at the Detroit Mineral show in the fall. He had purchased several specimens from a mineral partnership that John Davis and I share. Steve's micro photos are among the best on the web and wonderful landscapes of beautiful minerals. His galleries on Mindat.org are not to be missed.

Landing in Atlanta, I had 4 hours until my last leg of my trek home began. Reflecting back to another fellow collector staying at the house with us by the name of Stephen Kotlowski, I trotted off to grab some food and something to drink before my next flight. Stephen and I hit it off from the start. We share like passions such as rocks, and even fishing! Funny thing is, we were facebook friends already and didn't even know it. Stephen is a world class facetor; you've probably seen his work and not known that it was his faceting you were looking at. If you happen to watch Prospectors on the Weather Channel on TV, you have seen the huge faceted Topaz crystals from Richard Fretterd and Jean Cowman. The two that come to mind are the Agnus Dei tribute Topaz which weighs in at a whopping 1345 carats earning it the title of the largest North American faceted Topaz, and the Sweetheart Topaz at 524 carats. I was lucky enough to be able to hold the Sweetheart Topaz in my hand and see it up close. Stephen had a case at the main show and had a whole slew of very large fine faceted gems including a 1.62 carat faceted Zektzerite, which is also a record, in its own right. Stephen is a new friend that will become a longtime friend, an amazing man, a true artist of cutting ugly rocks and making them pretty.

One hour before my flight to South Bend I go back to the gate to see if I could change my seat from an isle to a window so I could sleep on my way home. I had been up since 4 am when I started this journey. As I approached the gate, I knew something had happened.

The gate that read hours before, South Bend IN, had changed to Phoenix Az. Talking with the Delta agent that was at the gate confirmed my worst fears, my flight to South Bend had been canceled owing to bad weather back home and no rescheduling had taken place. I was directed to the Delta Help desk about a mile away in Concourse C. After arriving at the help desk and waiting in line for over a hour. I was able to talk to the first of my guardian angels on my way home, Tina P was her name. She told me that due to the huge storm roaring its way across the Midwest, every airport east of Lake Michigan was closed down. This included places like Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Detroit, the further east the worse it became, Boston, LaGuardia, none of the airports were taking any more flights. I asked Tina if there was any way to get a flight to O'Hare in Chicago, knowing in my mind that I could find a way home from there. Only one more flight was available that day and was boarding in 35 minutes at Concourse A. Tina printed me off a ticket and I was off to the races, I had about 4 miles of escalators and Concourses to cover before I was able to get to gate A 20. Out of breath and time, I made it to the gate with just a few minutes left before the door to the aircraft was closed. To my surprise, my seat happened to be in the first class area of the plane. I have never flown first class, nor would I pay the extra thousands to do so, but this freakish trip had a little bit of a silver lining.

After settling down in the first class seat I was so blessed with, I reverted back to my thoughts of being able to spend time with my friends, wonderful miners and mineral photographers that I have known for years. Guys who I consider brothers, brothers I am only able to connect with every year in Tucson. My brother John Cornish, whom I spend time with every couple of weeks talking minerals over the phone was one of those close friends I was able to see. John owns quite a few claims throughout the west including Rat's Nest in Challis Idaho, where those amazing Heaulandites of the rich pick salmon color come from. Snails replaced by agates, the New Beginnings claim for quartz stalactites, John mines them all, he even just had mined at the Himalaya mine for Tourmalines on his way to Tucson, prove showing on a dinner plate in his room to any of the lucky people he shares his digging adventures with. The stories of mining you hear from John could fill a book, and probably should!

Being in Tucson allows me to catch up with another brother, from a different country. Michael Bainbridge, from Canada, a photographer and miner who is published in just about every book Lithographie Publishing has recently published. Michael is also an avid field collector like me, within the past year he brought to grass the best clinohumite crystals from Wilberforce that the world has ever seen. We always have a grand time harassing our mutual friends as we tour around the different shows together.

Touching down in Chicago at O'Hare was a tricky feat thanks to the lofty winds that had followed the weather front across the upper Midwest. Once we had rolled into our gate and deplaned, I stopped by the Delta agent, he printed me an Indiana Coach bus pass that would see me my final 90 minutes of travel home. We started out of Chicago with dry streets and hardly any traffic. Settling back into my perch at the front of the bus, my thoughts wander back to the dinners we shared and campfires we chatted around at the house in Tucson. We had quite a few well known mineral collectors from Canada including, Les Horvath of Quebec. He is extremely active in the Canadian Mineralogical Society, has also had the mineral Horvathite named after him. One of his books is on minerals that were discovered first in Canada.

About 12 miles outside of Michigan City we were moving right along traveling at 65 mph, abruptly we go from dry concrete pavement to an instantaneous white-out blizzard. The bus driver was having an exceedingly hard time keeping us on the road even though we had slowed to a slug's speed. At that point he announced that we ALL would be getting off the bus in Michigan City and that he would be going no further. I phoned my brother to ask him to drive the one hour from home to Michigan City. The weather being the way it was, there was no way for him to come pick me up, so again I'm stuck this time in Michigan City. As we pulled up to the bus stop, in what looked like an abandoned strip mall, an older lady behind me asked if she could give me a ride. She had overheard my conversation with my brother and knew what dire straits I was in. My final guardian angel was sitting behind me this whole time. Her name was Karen. Not knowing who I was or if I was even safe to talk too, she had offered to take me to the train station about 7 miles away. As we disembarked the bus trying to find her car, we were now fully aware of just how bad the storm was. Gusts of wind, whipping snow at 50 mph felt like bees stinging you all over. After brushing her car off and jumping in I was on my way to sit and wait for the last train of the night at 10:57.

Pulling up to the train depot (which was a glass box with 3 benches) I noticed a bar across the street that I could sit in and stay warm until the train came 2 and a half hours later. This gave me time to reflect back to the previous days. After dinner one night, Michelle Picard, the curator from the Museum of Natural History in Ottawa shared his rare species that he had found around the show with us. Another night we were lucky enough to have Bob Downs stop by after the Spann/Jordi party at the Casa Vicente. Bob is in charge of all of the mineral experiments on Mars using the Curiosity Rover. Every day they have to program the rover to do all of the tasks for the following day. Learning from Bob that they have currently found Jarosite on Mars was interesting since that mineral cannot form without water present.

Hearing the whistle of the train almost brought tears to my eyes, I knew that I was going to be able to make my final leg of this unpleasant trip to South Bend. I boarded and the conductor came around and charged me \$6 for the hour long trip. I told the conductor he made an oversight because I would have given him \$300 to get me home. Overwhelmed by the terrible string of bad luck, and smiling because of my good luck with strangers helping strangers in need, my thoughts drift back to the main show with all of its glorious display cases. People were wooing and awing over the cases that are full of minerals that you'd never get to see other than at the TGMS. Being able to sit and talk with friends like Jared Freiburg, owner of Saga Minerals. Jared is a Geologist for the state of Illinois, working on Co2 sequestration projects. He is the reason you see all of the Linwood lowa Barites and Calcites that have been coming out the past couple of years. Knowing the miners that bring these wonderful things out of the ground always helps. I hung around Jared's booth for quite some time, helping where needed. Enjoying the conversations, the education you get when you are around knowledgeable mineral people has no comparison.

Pulling into South Bend airport on the train was nothing short of a miracle. Everything had aligned just right for me to be able to make it home that day. As I cleaned off my car and started it, I noticed that it was 2 am. I had traveled on two planes, a bus, and a train for 22 hours to reach this point. Home safe after a short drive, all I could do is smile, and wish all of my friends, my angels, and myself a Happy Valentine's day.
