

Rubies and Emeralds

Ruby and emerald are the most valuable of all gems. A large essentially flawless, deep red ruby weighing more than ten to fifteen carats might cost more than \$30,000 per carat.

Small gems of lesser color might cost as little as \$100 per carat.

Corundum with traces of other oxides as impurities make up these gems. The red color of ruby is due to a trace of chromium. The blue of sapphire is due to the presence of iron and titanium.

Gemstone Dyeing

You can dye your own easily at home with powdered Rit. Pick the color you wish, red, blue or green, and mix a small pack of Rit with a couple of ounces of wood alchol. Let your stones, polished or tumbled, soak in this solution in a small jar until the desired shade has been reached. This may take from thirty minutes to overnight. If too much color has been absorbed, soaking in clear wood alchol will remove the excess.

After dyeing, wash the stones in clear water, apply a good wax, and polish with a soft cloth.

Crazy lace, banded Brazilian agate and other agate can easily be dyed a more pleasing color.

Sanding Discs

Instead of throwing away worn out sanding discs, try this; Mix in small container - ½ teaspoon of any size grit you want, pour on top ½ teaspoon of waterglass (sodium silicate) mixed with ½ teaspoon of water. Mix and apply to used sanding disc and let dry for two hours. Discs will be as good as new.

Handy Hint

The monument maker uses a weak solution of oxalic acid to acquire the glossy shine on the granite. It is used as a polishing aid.

Dissolve a little oxalic acid in water and work into your felt buff or add to your polishing paste and try on agates. It works conders.

A piece of corduroy glued to soft rubber makes fine, inexpensive polishing material.

Ellis W. Courter, the new president of the AFMS, has always had a keen interest in community affairs. He is a past president of the Optimist Club of Northwest Detroit of which he has been a member for the last twenty-eight years. For many years he worked with the Boy Scouts of America as the Advisor of an Explorer Post. He also served the District and the Detroit Area Council in many capacities, including several years as District Cabinet Advisor. In 1974, he became a Regional Vice President of the American Federation and since has progressed through the chairs of this organization. With his current election as president of the AFMS, he automatically becomes the Vice President of the AFMS Scholarship Foundation with Dan McLennan of the Rocky Mountain Federation succeeding him as treasurer of the Foundation.

Mr. Courter is also a member of the Friends of Mineralogy and currently is the treasurer of the Southeastern Michigan Chapter of Friends of Mineralogy. Although now retired from the business world, for many years he was the Treasurer-Controller of the Michigan Northern Division of Electrographic Corporation.
