



MAYOR HOFES TO PURCHASE BIG BOULDER

Mayor Louis A. Clapes, of Stamford, Conn., wants his city to buy a rock.

The thought might sound frivolous to many. However, the rock that Clapes has in mind is no ordi-

nary piece of granite.

The stone is called Rimmon Rock. It is 45 feet high and is reputed to be one of the three largest "glacial erratics" east of the Mississippi River.

Geologists say that the rock was deposited near Stamford during the Visconsin Ice Age. It rests on a privagely owned tract of land. The owner of the land wants the city to buy the site for \$45,000.

Clapes said that he hasn't formally asked the city's fiscal boards to buy Rimmon Rock, but he said he plans to do so if city residents support the idea.

The reason Clapes wants to purchase the reck is to preserve it from the bulldozer.

At present, the rock isn't in any danger from developers, said the mayor, but he added that several groups have expressed the desire to insure the rock's future.

Archeologists have said that at least three different groups of Indians lived in the vicinity of the rock through the ages. One group of Indians apparently lived near the rock about 5500 BC.


Scholarship gains

Scholarship Chairman Katharine Steinbrenner reports that since the Midwest show in Cedar Rapids last August, fifteen clubs have sent in contributions amounting to \$1,033.52. As a result, eleven Midwest clubs have advanced their Scholarship status as follows: Minnowa Rock & Gem Club, 400%; State Line Gem & Mineral Soc., 1400%; Joliet Gem Club, 100%; Calumet Gem & Mineral Soc., 400%; Lakeland Gem Club, 1500%; Southern Illinois Earth Science Club, 300%; Old Capitol Geological Club, 600%; Stone Head Mineral & Lapidary Club, 100%; Beacon Rock & Fossil Club, 100%; Midwest Mineralogical & Lapidary Society, 1100%; Northwest Wisconsin Gem & Mineral Society, 400%.

She reports the first Midwest Scholarship Auction in Cedar Rapids was a success and appears to be an excellent way to increase the Scholarship Fund.

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Perhaps the most important book for rockhounds appearing in recent months is the 19th edition of "Manual of Mineralogy" by Emeritus Prof. Cornelius S. Hurlbut, Jr. of Harvard and Prof. Cornelius Klein of Indiana University (John Wiley & Sons, 532 pages). Although this reviewer would have preferred to get a revision of the "Textbook of Mineralogy", the "Manual" is a very useful book with a new section on petrology and major expansions of the history of the science, coverage of crystallography, mineral chemistry and updated tables. Professor Hurlbut has edited the last four revisions of this basic text.

"The Complete Book of Rock Tumbling" by Christopher S. Hyde and Richard A. Matthews (Chilton Book Co., 183 pages) brings together much of the lore and the hitherto scattered methods and secrets of tumbling, which has become one of the most popular branches of lapidary art. Attention should also be called to an admirably written and illustrated book, "Mosaics with Natural Stones", by Walter Lauppi (Sterling Publishing Co., 96 pages), which certainly should inspire many rockhounds to try their hands at an art that has as old a tradition as any creative activity of man. The same company has also issued "Rock and Gem Polishing" and "Pebble Collecting and Polishing", both by Edward Fletcher.

Last but not least, this reviewer wishes to mention modestly "Rocks Minerals Gems and Fossils" by Donal Dinwiddie and Russell P. MacFall, (Popular Mechanics Press, 1978, 203 pages) which is a greatly expanded version of a well received book by the second author published some years ago. Described by the publisher as a complete book on collecting, identifying, shaping, displaying, evaluating and polishing, the book is a notable for its 24 pages of color on earth and moon rocks in the title classifications. Dinwiddie is a former editor of "Popular Mechanics" magazine and MacFall is a past president of the Midwest Federation.
