#### DINOSAUR EMBRYO FOUND IN FOSSIL EGG

The oldest dinosaur egg yet found in the northern hemisphere appears to contain a tiny fossilized embryo says Utah scientist who headed the discovery team.

CAT scans performed on the egg by the three different hospitals reveal an object about an inch and a half long that is almost certainly the fossil remains of a dinosaur embryo just a few days old, says Wade E. Miller, a geologist at Brigham Young University.

Other dinosaur eggs with embryos inside have been found, but this one from Utah's Cleveland-Lloyd Dinosaur Quarry is older than most. The egg, which probably came from an allosaurus, a large meat-eating dinosaur, about 150 million years ago, is twice as old as most other eggs found in the northern hemisphere. Because the egg is so well preserved, Miller speculates that it was still inside the mother when she died.

#### ABALONE

The colors occurring on the inside of abalone shells arise from the interference of light waves by the laminations of nacre deposited by the abalone. unattractive outer layer of the shell can be removed with nitric acid. After removal, the inside and outside of the shell will be similar in appearance. Nitric acid is very toxic. It should not be used indoors. When used outdoors, the work should be done so that the fumes are blown away from you. Wear rubber gloves. Apply the acid with a stick that has been pounded into a brush. To stop local action of the acid, dab the spot with household ammonia. To stop all of the acid's action, wash the entire shell with household ammonia, and then with clear water.

### MONTANA AGATE

It has always been a mystery how the peculiar scenes got inside a rock as hard as agate. It is the claim of geologists that the little spots were caused by infinitely minute seams or fissures in the softer parts of the rock being filled with metallic oxides when the world was young. These oxides make four different colors that form in the various combinations of colors when blended together, or appear in single colors in each rock.

The red color is oxide of iron, the black is oxide of manganese, the green is oxide of copper, and the blue is oxide of nickel. This theory has been elaborated by the use of high powered microscopes which show the tracings of little canals closed so that the naked eye could not detect it, but the oxides remained staining the rock in wonderful designs.

The fern-like and branch effects of the trees, grass, and shrubbery come from the fact that the canals branched out in various subdivisions, with smaller canals from a common center. In addition to these canals, the rock became flawed through a period of evaporation which, according to scientists, had taken more than 3 million years to reduce the stone to the hardness of 7 on the Mohs scale.

These canals and flaws have been healed by soft silicate formation of which the stone is a part. The evaporation has caused the oxides to take on such forms as seen on the window after a frosty night.

Technically, Montana agate is known as dendritic agate and the moss spots are called dendrites. There can never be two pieces alike, even if they are cut from the same stone.

#### CARE OF IVORY

While reading Ventura Associates, a 1983 edition of cleaning hints, I was surprised to read "DON'T PUT IVORY IN THE DARK"! It is one substance that needs light. If you keep it in a dark spot, it tends to yellow.

If it has started to yellow, you can retard this by taking 1/2 lemon, rubbing it in some salt, and then running it over the ivory object. The lemon will work on the yellow, and after it is dry, just take a soft cloth that has been dampened with some lukewarm water and rub it to give it a bright new shiny finish.

#### TUMBLING HINT

For tumbling rocks use whole grain oats to carry the grit and polish. Enough oats should be added to keep the rocks from knocking together. Whole grain oats can a purchased at any feed store.

#### WHAT IS AMBER?

Not a stump of the amber tree remains today. Enough of its parts (cones, needles, bark, etc.) have been preserved in its own resin to earn it a scientific name, "Pinus Succinfers", the amber bearing pine.

It was an enormous tree, perhaps 100 feet high, evidenced by hunks of amber that have been found weighing up to 15 kilograms (approx. 33 lbs.)

It was when trees were damaged by wind or disease the resin dropped down on the bark and spread across the forest floor. Engulfed insects were so perfectly preserved even the hairs on legs of a fly can be seen under a microscope. Amber is not only classified as a fossil, but also as an organic gem.

### HINTS & TIPS

When making an irregular shaped cabochon, such as a heart, that cannot be fully cut or polished at the wheel, finish cutting with a carborundum stick. Sand with silicon carbide cloth wrapped around a popsicle stick. Unless the crevice is very deep, it will polish on a leather buff.

To tell the difference between chrome and nickel plating, blow on it. If the moisture clears without iridescence it is chrome. If it leaves a rainbow, it is nickel.

Bola cord worn out? When you are putting bola tips on cords, use Elmer's Glue. When the cord wears out, by soaking in water, the tips come off easily and can be used again.

So you think you have Jade:

- 1. If a small chip is knocked off at the end of the suspected rock, the freshly broken surface should NOT sparkle in the sun. If it sparkles or glitters, it is not jade.
- 2. If you can scratch it with a knife point, it is not jade.
- 3. It should be much heavier than a common rock of similar size.
- 4. Tap the specimen lightly with the point of your hammer. If a small moon shaped fracture shows up, it may be agate or jasper but not jade!

#### A SOLUTION TO A MUSTY PROBLEM:

How many times the trip to a bookstore is a disappointment. The volumes or periodicals wanted are too musty to consider purchasing. The smell alone is a strong deterrent — and to one with allergies, am impossibility. But there is a way to rid books and magazines of this disagreeable odor. One that is easy and inexpensive. I recently acquired some very early MINERALOGICAL RECORDS which were sold very cheap because they were so musty they were virtually impossible to hold and read. After treatment, they have been read from cover to cover and now reside with the other volumes in my collection. Place in one end of a box that is larger than the material to be deodorized, several handfuls of untreated charcoal briquettes. Wedge open the books or magazines here and there with something that air may circulate. Twigs work well! Place a rolled up newspaper between your valued items and the briquettes. being sure there is room for plenty of air movement. Close the box and wrap tightly in a plastic bag, and leave it alone, for as long as 3 to 4 weeks, if necessary. It works! Try it!

# TIPS FOR PREPARING A DISPLAY CASE

The following article is from the Shawmish Roktawk and Escomo and seemed to be appropriate as some of our club members prepare for our Labor Day weekend show:

SHOWMANSHIP - is showing off your collection and creating an educational exhibit which could be the highlight of your hobby.

<u>CLEANLINESS</u> - Your exhibit should be neat...clean fingerprints from your specimens. Fold scotch tape or masking tape around your fingers to pick up the loose lint or dust from your case liner.

BACKGROUND - Try to display your items on material that will be as inconspicous as possible. Devote time to background and risers to keep the viewer's eyes on the subject of the display.

- 1. Do not use satin as it reflects too much light.
- 2. Patterned material detracts from the display.
- 3. Do not gather, pleat, or ruffle the background fabric.
- 4. Good colors are light gray, beige, or pastels.
- 5. Use velvet for real fine jewelry.
- 6. Dark materials would be good for light-colored specimens... but not with dark-colored items. Light gray tone or blue is very good as a background and will set off tints as well as shades. The palest pinks look richer on the blues. Black snowflake obsidian is dramatic on blue.

Lighting above flat cases or inside the upright cases will show off your case to best advantage without too many shadows.

Styrofoam is suitable for risers. Cover carefully with background material using pins to fasten the fabric into the foam. I find I can use cardboard on the boxing under the fabric to hide the pins and make a neat edge. We use "foam-board" as the base, sides and back of our cases. This is still enough to stand without warping and not too bulky. Foamboard can be purchased at art stores or at book stores in various sizes.

Arrangement is important...fine gems or specimens scattered hit and miss distract from one another because they make the eyes jump. Your eyes are trained to read in a straight line, or follow a graceful curved line. Specimens can be arranged in curves, ovals, or a pleasing design...as long as they are uncluttered. Give plenty of room to your prized specimens. Overcrowding makes the mind and eye want to pass up a "muddle".

Large or heavy items should be at the back and not all on one side. Focus on your most spectacular item toward the center. Smaller items will be best toward the front. As you try to balance your case, remember that bright colors strike the eye first.

Labels are important in identifying your display. If all items are one stone from one area, one lable is sufficient. If you use labels for each item, make them all the same size and of material heavy enough not to curl in the heat. Typewritten labels are better than handwritten as they are easier to read.

If you entering an exhibit into competition, remember that you are not competing against anyone but yourself. When a case is judged you are judged on your workmanship, quality, howmanship, labeling, variety of materials shown, at the variation of your work, and

educational value plus a few others such as specimen preparation and orientation. The judges give you points on a 1 to 100 scale for each area and then they are totalled and compared with the judges. The average of the judges scores determine the total score of your exhibit. The top score is the one that receives the trophy and others receive second or third place ribbons.

Putting a case into competition is an experience. It is a lot of work but it is worth it if you should happen to receive the top points.

Whether you put a case into competition or just in the general viewing section, be sure to change your display from year to year and not put the same exhibit in each year. People remember seeing the same exhibits from year to year and wonder if we know about other things.

If you don't know how to make a display to exhibit your work, ask around as there are those who would be glad to offer help and suggestions to you. It is always the first step that is the hardest because once you have done it, then it is easier the next time.
